Annual Tree and Shrub Sale-April 19th-20th, 2024

Each year, the Montgomery County SWCD holds a pre-order sale of quality trees and shrubs. These seedlings and transplants provide Conservation opportunities such as wildlife habitat, natural landscaping, windbreaks, reforestation, and fruit.

The District tries to provide a few new tree choices each year to go along with the "staples". This year, a few new species are Black Cherry, Black Walnut, Northern Catalpa, Blackberry, Cranberry and Arkansas Black Apple. We also have the staples such as Sugar Maple, American Arborvitae, White Oak, Gala Apple, and Blueberries.

An order form is enclosed in this newsletter, along with the information about all of the selections that we have to offer this year. This program is open to everyone, and you do not need to be a Montgomery County resident to order. Trees are to be picked up on April 19th or 20th at the location provided in the reminder post card.

NOTE: All of these trees are bare-root seedlings/transplants, sold only in bundles of the specified quantities. They are <u>NOT</u> potted trees. For additional info, or to order online, visit us at:



Conservation Year in Review-2023

- The year 2023 was a very busy year in terms of implementation of projects. To get things started, the District got a stairway and walking path established to connect the Chuctanunda trail with Veteran's Park in Amsterdam. We also held 2 different tire recycling events. In the Spring, 85 tons of ag-tires were collected, and in the Fall, 19.5 tons of passenger vehicle tires were collected.
- With grant-funded projects, a few of them are still being worked on as we speak. On 3 different farms, manure storage facilities were installed. In addition to those, 6 more Heavy Use Area Protections were designed and installed. There was also roughly 18,500 linear feet of fencing and 900 feet of access road/laneway. These projects were installed on a total of 7 different farms.
- In the Spring time, District employees installed several hundred trees in a buffer area along approximately 1,300 linear feet of stream bank. Due to high temperatures and very dry conditions, once the trees and tree tubes were installed, the District employees watered the trees for several weeks while they were getting established.



The year 2023 was the first year that the district had two no-till drills for the entire season, One seeder is a Great Plains 1006nt and the other seeder is a Habybuster 107c. Below are the numbers of acreage that each drill did compared to 2022 (the Great Plain drill was only used for the fall of 2022 season). If you are in Montgomery County, the Drills are free to use, but it is a first come-first serve basis, so availability can be tricky; but we do our best to keep them moving.


Is local food important to you? Are you having trouble sourcing the food you want near you? Are you looking to find a local source for vegetables, fruit, milk, or meats? You don't have to look too far. Download the Harvest Connection App, or go to the website at www.harvestconnection-ny.com. Local farms are listed here with their products, and it's great way to purchase from local producers.

Are you a local farmer with a retail outlet on your farm? Do you want more promotional abilities? If you are, then look no further; join Harvest Connection. This is a website and app that will let the consumer find you and your products. You can update your listing with seasonal products and specials yourself. There is also the ability to post pictures and have another platform to promote your business.

Agricultural Environmental Management (AEM)

Farmers interested in implementing conservation practices on their farms have a unique opportunity this year. Farms must have a conservation plan addressing farm resource concerns. Projects will be based on local

watershed needs and will be ranked in order of priority. State funding requests should be a maximum of \$50,000. All practices must be designed and built to NRCS specifications. Preference will be given to projects under \$20,000. Examples of practice systems that will be considered for funding include, but are not limited to:

Prescribed Rotational Grazing System; Water system infrastructure, fencing, trails and walkways.

Riparian Buffer System: Stream buffers, tree planting, stream crossing **Soil Health System:** Cover crop, no-till, pasture and hay land planting

Erosion Control System: Diversion, waterways, trails and walkways, roof runoff structure (gutters, drip trench)

Livestock Heavy Use Area Protection Systems: Barnyard, vegetated treatment areas, HUAP, waste transfer, storage

Please contact the office for more information on systems as the above list is not exhaustive.

Funding is available locally through assistance provided by the NY Department of Agriculture and Markets. The farm must be a participant in the AEM program with the ability to cost share the practice within the **2-year contract timeline**. The State cost share is 75% with opportunities up to 87.5% but will be prioritized based on the farmer's contribution.

AEM is voluntary, locally-led, and comprehensive approach that further advances environmental management on farms across all sizes and commodities. This program delivers technical support and financial incentives needed to help farmers to implement conservation practices critical to the protection of water quality and other natural resources. AEM helps to ensure that New York's farms remain viable and continue to meet their business objectives in an ever-changing marketplace.
